

# BEFRIENDING SERVICES NATIONAL DIRECTORY 2016

A comprehensive directory of Befriending Services for Older People in Ireland.



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#### **PART 1: Introduction**

### 1.1 About the Directory:

Down through the years ALONE has received numerous calls from people across the country looking for Befriending Services in their area.

We found that there was no central database for local Befriending Services, so in 2013 we began the task of collating the details of all these services. We published the first directory in 2014, and this is the updated version.

#### 1.2 About ALONE

ALONE is a national organisation that helps older people in need to age at home. We work with all older people who need support with issues like loneliness, ill health, poverty, poor housing or homelessness. We support them through these challenges and link them in with the relevant services they need to live in the community. ALONE is independent and receives no government funding for the day to day running of our services. We have 250 active volunteers that are trained and supported by professional staff. All our services are quality approved ensuring we are high value and low cost. 100% of all donations goes directly to providing services to older people in need.

**Our Vision is** of a society where older people are included as valued and empowered members of the community.

**Our Mission is** to support older people in need through Supportive Coordination, Befriending, Supportive Housing and Campaigns for Change.

**Our Core values** are Partnership, Innovation, Dignity and respect for the individual, Transparency, Companionship, Non-Judgemental.

#### What we do:

ALONE's **Befriending Service** provides companionship to older people who are socially isolated through a weekly volunteer visit. Volunteers provide support with practical tasks and basic advocacy. The Befriending Service is designed to alleviate the negative impacts loneliness has on mental and physical health. All ALONE volunteers are trained and supported by professional staff. If the older person's needs change, staff coordinate the additional supports the older person needs to allow them to remain living at home.

#### Why do we train and vet our volunteers?

In ALONE we strongly believe that a service that is based on a one to one

relationship, should be properly managed and delivered by high quality volunteers. All our volunteers go through a comprehensive training and vetting programme to ensure that the older people can be guaranteed a quality service. Volunteers are also supported in their role by professional staff. The older people who are befriended get regular check in calls to ensure they continue to be happy with the service. This approach manages risk and ensures both the older person and volunteer are protected. ALONE Befriending Service and ALONE's Volunteer Programme both have achieved quality marks for service delivery.

ALONE's **Support Coordination Service** works with older people who need extra support to age at home. Professional staff work with the older person to assess their immediate situation and when necessary link them in with the relevant services in their community. Staff maintain contact with the older person as required to ensure long term solutions have been achieved.

ALONE's **Supportive Housing Service** provides homes to older people who are homeless or at risk of homelessness and need a level of support. Our Support Coordinators work with each resident to ensure they have the relevant services they need to live independently. The level of support an older person receives is based on their changing needs. Every ALONE home is age friendly and is maintained to a high standard.

ALONE's **Campaigns for Change** are designed to tell the truth about the challenges some older people face. We work directly with older people in need, meaning that all our campaigns represent the real situations facing the older people we work with. As well as highlighting issues, our campaigns are also designed to make real changes at an individual, local and political level. In ALONE we are working on a ten year vision where older people will have the choices and access to services which help them age at home.

#### **ALONE's commitment to Quality and Transparency**

In ALONE we take a leadership role around quality, transparency and accountability.

- We are the first organisation in the Republic of Ireland to achieve the internationally recognised Quality in Befriending Award.
- We have achieved the Investing in Volunteers Quality standard.
- We have become the second charity in Ireland to achieve the internationally recognised ISO Quality Standard for services delivery.
- An external evaluation of ALONE's Befriending service was undertaken and the report published in 2015.

- We are a registered charity. Our charity number is CHY 8259.
- We comply with ICTR standards in Fundraising.
- Our accounts are externally and independently audited and we comply with SORP standards.
- We publish an Annual Report which shows the work we do, the outcomes achieved and our income and expenditure.
- In 2016 our Support Coordination service will be externally assessed. The report will be published.
- Our Board operates to good practice guidelines for governance and has signed up to Governance Code.
- We are an approved Housing Body.
- We have signed up to the Government's Voluntary Code for Housing Bodies.
- We are a member of the Irish Council for Social Housing (ICSH) and we participate in the HAPM (Housing Association Performance Management) survey.
- ALONE adhere to data protection guidelines and have an ALONE data protection policy.

#### 1.3 Loneliness as a Health Issue

#### Loneliness is a health issue and Befriending is a health intervention

Loneliness has been shown to have a negative impact on people's health. Individuals who suffer from loneliness are left more vulnerable to a variety of health issues.

Numerous studies have shown how Befriending is proven to be a health intervention.

'Loneliness and isolation is one of the most horrible feelings a person can have. A person can be in a big crowd of people and still feel consumed by loneliness, because the people are strangers who do not care about you'. Jack is 70 and uses the ALONE Befriending Service.

#### Here's what the research proves:

- Loneliness can lead to a number of health issues including depression, dementia, disability, cardiovascular disease, infectious illness, cognitive deterioration and mortality (Steptoe et al 2013).
- "Loneliness is an important predictor to depression," (Kamiya et al 2013).
   Depression is projected to be the second leading cause of disability worldwide by 2020 (TILDA2011).
- In an RCSI 2005 study it is documented that 29% of older people living alone reported feeling lonely compared to 6% of other categories. In Ireland, estimates suggest that the overall economic cost of mental health problems is €3 billion per annum; only cardiovascular disease is likely to contribute more to the overall burden of illness (TILDA, 2011).
- "Social isolation increases the risk of developing dementia" (Cacioppo, 2007).
- "Social isolation has also been associated with elevated blood pressure, C-reactive protein, and fibrinogen and with heightened inflammatory and metabolic responses to stress" (Steptoe et al 2013).
- There are disproportionate numbers of females among people with high support needs reporting loneliness. The proportion of females living alone increases with age, with females accounting for almost three quarters of all persons aged 85 and over living alone (CSO, 2012). According to a 2005 report by RCSI 32% of older people with high severe functional impairments felt lonely "quite/very often" while 38% felt lonely "sometimes" which demonstrates a strong link between disability, depression, high support needs and loneliness.
- Befriending schemes have proved one of the more effective services for combating both isolation and loneliness

In 2015 ALONE carried out research on our own Befriending Service. The research found that when older people were asked whether or not they felt isolated or lonely following befriending, 86% said 'no' .This represents a 60% decrease in isolation and loneliness since they started being visited by a volunteer.

## **PART 2: Befriending Network Ireland**

### 2.1 Befriending Network Ireland



Following on from the research that was carried out in 2014 to develop the first edition of this directory ALONE decided to establish a national network to provide support to befriending services.

Befriending Network Ireland was established in June 2015 and since then there has been significant progress in implementing its two year strategic plan. Some of the key milestones are listed below

- An official membership for Befriending Network Ireland was established towards the end of 2015, with a membership leaflet distributed to all befriending services linked with the network.
- A logo for Befriending Network Ireland was designed.
- Monthly Befriending Network Ireland newsletters were sent out from late 2015 to keep the wider Network updated on changes and the progress made.
- Two sub groups have been created an Advisory Group and Data Collection Subgroup
- A survey has been sent to all members around data collection on all befriending services
- Volunteer and Coordinator training has been provided to the network.
- A profile on Befriending Network Ireland along with links to research in befriending is also present on the ALONE website along with a map of all current services linked to the network.

#### **Befriending Network Ireland's Vision Statement**

A society where older and vulnerable adults experiencing loneliness and social isolation are supported by quality befriending services in Ireland to improve health and well-being.

#### **Mission Statement**

To promote the work of befriending, and support befriending groups in providing quality services to older and vulnerable people to alleviate social isolation and loneliness.

#### Goals

- 1. To provide a network for Befriending Groups in Ireland and promote information exchange and shared learning.
- 2. To support and promote best practice training, resources and quality assurance tools.
- 3. To collect evidence-based data on the value and impact of befriending services on health and well-being. To promote research and to highlight the link between isolation, loneliness and health and well-being.

- 5. To ensure the future sustainability of Befriending Network Ireland and ensure that it is managed in a professional, transparent and effective manner.

### 2.2 Quality in Befriending

In 2016 ALONE was the first Irish Befriending organisation to receive the "Quality in Befriending Award", an internationally recognised standard developed by Befriending Networks Ltd in Scotland.



### **PART 3: Befriending Services in Ireland**

The accreditation process, carried out by Befriending Networks Ltd in the UK, covers nine practice area's relating to the effective operation of a befriending service including competency in volunteer recruitment, vetting, induction, training, matching and supervision. In addition to volunteer management the application also audited assessment processes, risk management, governance, monitoring and evaluation.

As a vital part of achieving a quality standard in befriending is training, BNI aims to assist befriending services across Ireland receive a similar award through various forms of training listed below.

### 2.3 Coordinator and Volunteer Training

As part of Befriending Network Ireland's goal to support and promote best practice training, resources and quality assurance tools, training is delivered to aspiring and current Befriending Coordinators and Befriending Volunteers.

Coordinator training involves one full day of training covering areas such as how to set-up a befriending service for older people, where to start in operating your service and ongoing management of your service. This training is usually held in Dublin, and upcoming dates are normally published on the Befriending Network Ireland section of the ALONE website.

BNI Volunteer training is available to Befriending Services who would like to have their volunteers fully trained in advance of visiting an older person. The training consists two modules delivered on two separate days for quality assurance. Subject areas covered include boundaries, active listening and the dos and don'ts of befriending. The training is delivered on site at a location convenient to each service.

We continue to receive many calls from lonely and isolated older people across Ireland. When these calls come to ALONE we work to identify local Befriending Services where we could refer these enquires on to. This can remain a challenge as certain parts of the country do not have local Befriending Services that can provide a home visit to an older and/ or vulnerable person. Gaps in service provision still remain outside major cities, Cork, Dublin and Limerick. This coupled with the geographic isolation of rural Ireland could lead to further isolation of older people in our communities, putting their health at serious risk. With the support of Befriending Network Ireland we hope to address such gaps in the future which will impact positively on the general health of older people across Ireland.

#### The ongoing challenge of sustainability

From the publication of the previous directory in 2014, some services ceased operation. A key issue that appears to have contributed to this is a cut in funding which made these services unsustainable. Other possible contributing factors can be attributed to poor training and proper resources. Through the support of Befriending Network Ireland we hope that Befriending Services can become more sustainable in the future.

Details on Service	Ballyhoura Rural Services operates both a visitation service and a Community Phone Link service.  The visitation service consists of a Community Support Worker visiting an individual once or twice weekly. This can simply be for a friendly chat, company on an outing or travel, assisting with phone calls, appointments or filling out forms etc. Increasingly, Community Support Workers provide respite relief to carers and family members caring for older people suffering from early onset dementia and/or Alzheimers Disease.

Community Phone Link consists of a friendly phone call once or twice a week from a trained member of staff and is available to anybody in the Ballyhoura area who would appreciate a regular call, particularly older people. The service is free of charge and operates Monday to Friday from 9am to 5pm.
We offer a Helping Hands Handyman service where we undertake odd jobs/repairs around the house and garden for a small fee to cover costs incurred. We also have a reminiscence project where we record Clients/Community Members life-stories and publish them in booklet and digital sound recording formats.

Details on Service	Good morning Service: is a free telephone service for people aged 60 and over. A local volunteer calls an individual on a regular basis to ensure they are safe and well and also to provide help and support. The Service is managed from the main office in Buncrana covering the Inishowen area and five outreach centres hosted by community organisations in Donegal Town, Burtonport, Falcarragh, Letterkenny, and Lifford. All administration is carried out in the Buncrana Centre.
	Advocacy: The service also advocates for older people and refers clients to health services and any other organisation that may be of help in relation to each individual's needs and concerns.
	Care & Repair: In Inishowen the service provides a Care & Repair service offering older people help with home maintenance; light repair work; shopping; transport and social services.
	The Friendly Face Befriending Scheme is an extension to the Good morning telephone service. The scheme aims to further reduce the social isolation of people aged 60+. A volunteer befriender is matched with an individual who may feel socially isolated, lonely or vulnerable and visits them each week for approximately two hours.
